1099 Tax Reporting Repeal Finally Law

On April 5, the U.S. Senate voted overwhelmingly (87-12) to repeal the 1099 IRS reporting mandate, and President Obama signed it into law on April 14. The provision would have required businesses to file 1099 forms with the IRS any time they spent \$600 or more a year with any other business. The North Carolina Chamber has tracked this issue for months and sent numerous letters and action alerts – and we finally have a victory! The 1099 tax mandate, which was part of the last year’s federal health care law, would’ve bogged down businesses, especially small businesses, with job-killing paperwork and reporting requirements.

How NC Senators and Reps Voted

Both of North Carolina’s senators, Richard Burr (R) and Kay Hagan (D), voted “yes” on the bill.

In previous House action, only two NC representatives voted “no” on repealing the 1099 mandate.
